

UGANDA, AFRICA: Sr. Patricia Hickman PBVM from the Friends of Hospice Africa in Australia, writes to request for an assistance to support the *Hospice Africa Uganda* - founded in 1993. The Hospice was established to offer Palliative Care throughout Sub-Saharan Africa. This project aims at helping those suffering from terminal illness (HIV/AIDS and Cancer patients including children) to live out their lives as fully and as respectfully as possible until they are called by their Creator. In Uganda 25,000 children acquire HIV from their mothers each year and only 25% of HIV positive children are on antiretroviral therapy. About 350,000 patients in Uganda with illnesses need palliative care. Although higher numbers are expected to come to care children are grossly under-represented on Palliative care programmes because of social and cultural barriers faced by this vulnerable group. CLEAN WATER, VIETNAM: "I am John Vũ Duy Ngự, Parish Priest of Plei Kòbei, Kontum Diocese, close to the border to Cambodia. Plei Kòbei parish comprises 3 villages of minority people of Jrai and Ha-lăng. It has a population of 5000 people and their main source of water is from mountain creeks, which has been polluted seriously by chemicals of fertilizers and insecticides. This is a result of all the farming but for most of the people it is their only source of income. We would like to build a water filter system with a capacity 4000L/day, and educate the people about health care and usage of the clean water. We hope that the MSC Mission Office will consider and approve the project so that the local people can have clean water and basic hygiene in their daily lives. MAPUORDIT, SOUTH SUDAN: Latest update from Sr. Rita: "Dear Adrian, My thanks for the two separate amounts of funding sent for fresh water projects in South Sudan. Also on a very positive note, rain came; for some too late but for others, crops were able to be revived and be harvested. Our local vegetable gardens are producing abundant fresh tomatoes, cucumbers, onion, greens of African varieties; since mid-June we have had almost continual rains. We were able to visit many of the projects where our water tanks were making a difference to the lives of those in most need – especially the villages affected by cyclone Winston. We were impressed with the ministry at Chevalier Hostel – a home run by Br. Kaake for disadvantaged youth; offering them food, shelter, and an opportunity to complete

their schooling. We were also excited to visit CTC (Chevalier Training Institute) in Wainadoi where those most marginalised are given an opportunity to develop a trade (auto-mechanic, welding and joinery) in order to secure

future employment. Sacred Heart Seminary in Wailoku was another place we visited. There, I was able to speak to and share a meal with our sixteen future priests – young men from Fiji, Kiribati, Futuna, Samoa and Chuuk. Kenji and I also visited a number of parishes where I was invited to offer Mass. The churches are full in Fiji – boisterous voices singing in raptured harmony, with great energy and warmth radiating from their smiling faces. ST. CATHERINE'S ORPHANAGE SCHOOL, JINJA, AFRICA:

"Dear Fr Adrian Meaney. I wish to introduce to you St. Catherine's Orphanage School; we have 447 pupils: 229 girls and 218 boys. We might reach a total of 570 pupils by next year. With the recent heavy rain here in Uganda, we faced many issues due to water-borne diseases such as Malaria, and Typhoid – the latter in particular from unclean drinking water. We recently decided to write and send you our request for financial assistance to purchase 4 tanks of 10,000L capacity each for water reserves for both the parish and the school. Any support of any kind would be greatly welcomed. With the Sisters, each child is given loving care. And while love doesn't cost, there are costs that come with love. The expenses to keep sanitized clean diapers, nourishing formula and nutritious meals is extremely high in our region, especially for the children with special needs" **Sr Mary Nankabirwa, Franciscan Sisters of St. Joseph of Jinja**

VINH HUNG PARISH, VIETNAM: Vinh Hung Parish, Phan Thiet Diocese, 215 km from Ho Chi Minh City is struggling with their need for clean water. Surrounded by different communities with a population of 10,000 people, the parish is located in the infertile alkaline remote mountain area in Ham Thuan Bac district. This area has long been considered to be contaminated for several reasons: the soil is impoverished and further contaminated with too much use of chemical fertilisers and insecticides. The wells are still infected with alum, lime, and toxin. Rev. Augustin Nguyen Cong Tru the Parish Priest writes to MSC Mission Office for an assistance in setting up a Water Refinery System to provide basic clean drinking water for the people. WABAG DIOCESE, ENGA PROVINCE, PNG:

AMERICA/VENEZUELA - Ten thousand working children: exploited, drugged, sexually abused:



Unemployment, exploitation, alcoholism, drug addiction, absent parents, physical and sexual abuse, are major problems that plague the lives of many young Venezuelans. The desperate economic conditions force many families to make their children work on the streets. Street children live by stealing, begging, and are victims of prostitution. The streets of the city of Barquisimeto, capital of the Venezuelan state of Lara, for example, are full of children and adolescents at risk. According to one survey of the nearly 1.6 million children Venezuelan workers, 300,000 are involved in a kind of formal economy, over one million in informal economy and 200 thousand in "marginal activities" such as drug trafficking and theft. These minors produce a vital income for their families. While some try to keep their job and continue to go to school, many end up dropping out of school permanently. (AP) (Agenzia Fides)

INDIA: THEY ARE ASKING FOR A LOT FOR THE POOR - in fact \$400,000.



Fr Darwin Thateus, the principal of the school in Dindigul has written to us: "Fr. Adrian, I am pleased to inform you that we have now completed the second floor building of the school. As you are aware the main aim of this project is to provide education for the disadvantaged children in the surrounding 12 villages. If it is not too much to ask we would like to continue developing the school, the next steps being to furnish the 20 new classrooms with benches to accommodate 350 students. Our total number of students is close to 600. We must now build an

administrative centre for the school, which we should have done in the beginning but instead focused on the children, and rooms for teachers and staff. We are ever grateful to you and your benefactors for the continuous support and generosity. Rest assured of our prayers. In Christ" – **Fr. Darwin Thateus MSC**

I had the privilege of laying the foundation for the school on the 15th December 2005. All the students come from poor farming families. Our MSC Congregation have given 6 priests to assist full-time in the formation of these students. To-date the staff and office workers have had to operate under sub-standard conditions. I visited the school in December 2017 and offered to help build A NEW ADMINISTRATION BLOCK.

CLEAN WATER PROJECTS, FIJI:

"Fr. Adrian, greetings from Viti Levu – I am happy to report that the following projects have been completed. Attached are the acquittals: **1) Nadrau:** the community here was severely affected by cyclones so we are pleased to have provided 1 x 5000L tank to the families of this small village. **2) Our Lady of Assumption Parish, Lomary, Pacific Harbour:** 2 x 5000L water tanks were requested by Fr. Patrick Teitiaua MSC, Parish Priest, for the schools. The tanks were placed on concrete foundations for stability and longevity. There is now ample clean drinking water for the entire school community. At the same time I would also like to submit the following projects: **1) Tailevu:** Br. Samson requests 1 x 10,000L tank for the poor villagers of Tailevu. **2) Lomary Parish presbytery and teachers' compound:** 2 x 10,000L water tanks for the parish community and the residences of the school staff. The existing structure is decrepit and requires replacement. We are experiencing an unusually long dry season, severely affecting our clean water supply. The tanks would ensure enough drinking water for the entire community for extended periods. **3) Vincentian Formation House, Wailoku:** Fr. Joseva Tuimavale has submitted an application requesting a 5,000L tank on behalf of the students in their seminary." – **Br. Kaake Ioane MSC – Director, MSC Mission Office Fiji**

Dandy Marababol has been successful in digging a deep well and installing a motorised pump and tank inside the grounds of the Por Cristo Home for the Abandoned Elderly. As you are aware they had a lot of problems reaching the necessary depth of 4m in such a rural area – the digging was manually done. Once this was achieved, things moved fairly quickly. Above the concrete reservoir a secure weather-proof hut was built

for the motorised pump. This was such a big job, taking a little over a year to fully complete but in the end it was well worth it. Such a difference clean drinking water makes! This diminutive little hut in the middle of an isolated village not only supplies the home for the abandoned elderly but also the entire surrounding population. Fr. Dandy was so grateful – he could not believe the generosity of the Mission Office and the wonderful benefactors who make all this possible. Water is such a simple thing yet so important – it continues to amaze me the difference our work is making.
